

Chair's Comments

At long last two of our much-heralded projects are actually happening. We have been talking about both improving the playground at Whitchurch Hill, and renovating the pond at Crays Pond, for several years!



If you are a nature lover, and have concerns for the local wildlife you might be thinking that we have acted very rashly, but sometimes you have to take what appears to be destructive action to preserve a habitat and provide an opportunity for a healthy ecosystem to develop.

The willow tree was sucking vast amounts of water out of the pond and contributing to the problems of very low water in dry years. As hot dry summers are becoming more frequent this problem will only be exacerbated.

As the pond has been opened up you can clearly see the large areas of plant growth in the middle of the pond. The pond is not a natural feature and, if left to its own devises, will gradually silt up and trees will colonise. Ponds are fast disappearing from our countryside as they become less needed by farmers and are filled in or left to silt up. They provide vital habitat for many aquatic species both in and around the pond.

As for the silt, the pond will be dredged later in the year, at the time least disruptive to the life cycles of the creatures which call the pond their home. We have taken advice from experts in pond ecology and are acting on their suggestions.

I hope we will be preserving the pond to be enjoyed by both man and beast for many years to come.

The playground is having less drastic treatment, but we hope will provide a more interesting and challenging space for local children to test their climbing skills and provide more scope for imaginative outdoor play.

The playground should be finished by the most important date in the summer calendar - the Whitchurch Hill Fete. This always takes place on the Saturday of the late May Bank Holiday weekend - May 25th this year.

Somehow the sun always shines and the fete provides plenty to keep the families and folks of the area amused and involved. There'll be lots of stalls selling all manner of goods, as well as children's races, a performing dog demonstration and a Punch & Judy show.

The very popular bottle raffle will be there as usual and the gift raffle has a top prize of £100. The WI will provide delicious home-made cakes for tea, there'll be a mobile pub to quench any thirsts and the parish councillors will perform their most important function of the year - running the barbecue!

We would like to point out that No Strong Views is one of only three choices that SODC gives the parish council. It does not illustrate tacit approval of an application. Typically it is supplemented with specific comments from the parish council highlighting areas of concern.

District Councillor's Commentary

Not many people know that there is a national league table of local councils based on the amount of collected waste that is recycled. In the past few years South Oxfordshire has hovered just off the number one spot, but last year, with a recycling rate of 61.6%, our District topped the table, with Vale of White Horse coming up in third place at 60.9%.



Helping South Oxfordshire is that 55% of the waste is made up of organic waste, principally garden waste.

The government publishes a wealth of statistics on waste and one figure that really struck me is that the amount of waste, across the country, going to landfill has dropped from 22 million tons in 2000/01 to 1.76 million tonnes in 2022/23. The reduction in landfill is made up of several factors including an overall reduction in household waste and increases in recycling and incineration.

There are imminent changes to the arrangements for paying for the garden waste collection service in South Oxfordshire which will be introduced from 1st April 2025 with a transition period from April 2024. At the moment, every brown bin has its own direct debit payment, which means that if you have more than one bin you have more than one direct debit, each on the anniversary of each brown bin service starting for you. From April 2025, the direct debit process will be replaced by a once a year payment in April for everyone, and once payment is made a sticker will be issued to be put on your bin so that the waste crew know that the service is paid for – no sticker, no collection! Apparently there have been some cases under the current system whereby bins are emptied when no direct debit payment has been made. Anyway, no need to panic yet as more information will be sent to you.

The current charge of £60 for a brown bin is also having to rise to £69 as the costs of the service provided by Biffa have increased and, as the garden waste service is a paid for service, it must breakeven and not be subsidised by other council tax payers. You may remember the difficulties of a year or so ago when Biffa could not provide the normal service because drivers and operators had left for other jobs. The contract with Biffa, which has been in place for the last 14 years has just been extended for a further two years. A recent waste satisfaction survey has yielded encouraging results for SODC household waste collections, indicating a high level of resident approval with this side of the service. An impressive 82% of respondents expressed satisfaction, or high satisfaction, with the overall quality of the service provided.

The move to extend the current contract was driven by central government's delay in clearly outlining the forthcoming changes within the waste industry stemming from the Environment Act 2021. The extra two years will provide the necessary space to develop a brand-new waste strategy to determine an approach for the next 10 years.

In setting the budget (and so Council Tax) for the coming year, although there are increases in various charges, there have also been savings. One of the biggest sources of income for the council is the return on investments, which have benefited from the recent general increases in interest rates. In the current year SODC will receive over £7million, £2million more than expected.

One of the savings that has been made is vacating the rented offices in Milton Park, which were costing some £1million a year. Looking ahead, the Council is pressing ahead with new offices as part of the Didcot Gateway Regeneration project. The capital cost of this is some £25million, which will be largely funded by borrowing, with projected borrowing costs in 2026/27 of £425,000.

It is worth noting that offices at Milton Park were rented for about eight years, a substantial cost with nothing to show for it at the end.

Crays Pond Goring Heath Community Speedwatch Group

Since August 2022 the Crays Pond Goring Heath Community Speedwatch group (CSW) has conducted over 60 CSW sessions across six different locations in Crays Pond and Whitchurch Hill. Each session typically lasts for one hour and the minimum requirement is that three operatives are in attendance. Every session is approved by Thames Valley Police (TVP). The results for each session are inputted to the TVP Community Speedwatch online portal. Offenders receive a warning letter from TVP and repeat offenders, or aggressive drivers may get a home visit.

Sessions have identified three troublesome blackspots in our community. The CSW group targets these locations; the aim being that about 75% of all sessions are attributed to these three sites.

- Garton End, Crays Pond, traffic heading east on the B4526 from the Goring direction speed limit 30mph. Highest speed recorded 50mph or 66% above the current speed limit. The good news at this location is that we have seen the best reductions in the percentage of speeding vehicles from when we first started. At the beginning we were regularly in the top teens approaching 20%. Now the average has settled at 7% which is a significant improvement. [Over 11 sessions]
- St Johns Church, Whitchurch Hill, traffic heading south on the B471 from the Crays Pond direction speed limit 40mph. Highest speed ever recorded 61mph or 52% over the current speed limit. The results here are not as encouraging as Garton End. Moderately better at perhaps 9% from 12% when we first started. [Over 17 sessions]
- Goffs Hill, Crays Pond, traffic heading north on the B471 from the Whitchurch Hill direction speed limit 30mph. Highest speed recorded 51mph or 70% above the current 30mph. What seems to work at Garton End in terms of a reduction over time of speeding vehicles, does not seem to work at Goffs Hill. Results have been broadly flat going from about 12% in the early days to circa 11% so really no change/no improvement. This location is broadly similar to Garton End in terms of traffic volumes and the speed limit of 30mph is the same. The only difference being that in Garton End we come from 40mph to 30mph through the village gates, and at Goffs Hill it is 50mph to 30mph. [Over 14 sessions].

Drivers are offered some leeway in speed before being formally reporting to TVP. Therefore, the real rate of speeding above 30mph/40mph would in reality be significantly higher than the recorded data - estimated to be circa 20% higher.

The Speedwatch initiative has gathered useful data to factually identify problem areas where longer term speed reductions measures such as Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) and/or speed cameras are needed. In the longer term this will need to be pursued by Goring Heath Parish Council.

Then select Thames Valley/Oxfordshire/Crays Pond-Goring Heath to join our Group. Then follow the links.

After completing the online training there is further on-the-job training you need to complete; new operatives will attend the first CSW session as an observer to 'look and learn'.

Fundraising for our new roof

Police and Crime Commissioner Update

Working in partnership to fight crime

Matthew Barber, the P&C Commissioner for

Thames Valley recently wrote to Parish Councils to highlight the work being done to support Thames Valley Police in fighting crime.

- Phase 1 of the Thames Valley CCTV Partnership was launched earlier this year to improve CCTV coverage and better use of technology to support strong local policing. The partnership provides new cameras owned, operated, monitored and maintained by the police with continued support from councils. Phase 1 covers Milton Keynes and Slough. Phase 2 is planned for Oxfordshire later this year.
- Community Safety Partnerships between the police and local government tackle anti-social behaviour and persistent criminal concerns. The funds allocated to them have been increased by 15% for 2025/26. This means that £11.4m will be provided for crime prevention work in local areas over the next four years.
- Parish Councils can apply for funding for crime prevention though the Community Fund. This takes money from criminals through the sale of stolen goods and provides it to good causes. £400,000 is available per year from this fund and many parishes and towns have already benefited from the scheme.
- Speeding causes great concern in many communities. The P&C Commissioner is working with the Chief Constable on a new road safety enforcement team. He supports Community Speedwatch and is looking to improve the support offered to Community Speedwatch volunteers. The Community Speedwatch scheme has recently been moved into the new Citizens in Policing portfolio with the Force, which means that as well as free equipment available from the P&C Commissioner's office, the support for volunteers will be improved.
- There has been a reduction in crime across the Thames Valley in the last year and the force is on target to have doubled the number of neighbourhood officers by the end of the financial year. This increase is set to continue, with further funds committed to put more officers into neighbourhood teams and recruit PCSOs and Special Constables.

The campaign to save the White Lion Crays Pond continues. *Help us to retain the ACV status.*

The story is a long one, but here is a brief update.

Up to 2019 the owner was living in the property, contrary to legislation, and was eventually asked to leave by a High Court Judgement. Since then the property has remained empty, and becoming more and more dilapidated.

In 2019 we were successful in retaining the 'Asset of Community Value' (ACV) status, (first granted in 2013), over the property.

The ACV means that the property cannot be sold by the owner unless offered to the community first. It is a useful tool in the community's armoury.



It can stop disposal of the property as an 'Investment Opportunity'

Since 2019 a Community Interest Company (CIC) in the pub's name has been established as a means of making offers to purchase and applying for Community Ownership Funds with which to purchase, renovate and manage its improvement. This is the vehicle that would own and run the property when we are successful.

We are now in the position to get the ACV nominated again and this is where we need your help as every 'Nomination' period of 5 years is a reapplication, not a renewal. As years go by it becomes more difficult to maintain ACV status, with the property left to deteriorate and remain unused by the owner.

Therefore we need to show that the community, both local and the surrounding, support the campaign

Why should you help?

As you know, once a pub is lost to development you never replace the community benefits that it provides. It is not just a pub, but a hub that can provide food, drink, accommodation, a meeting place, a market place, a focus for walkers, cyclists and others, or just a place to sit, relax and reflect. It can also add to the local commercial activity and can provide employment.

The White Lion Crays Pond is ideal, with its position and land, to provide all this, and not simply become a plot for more residential development.

Supporting the project and to retain the 2024 ACV nomination helps the wider community decide what happens to The White Lion property.

Many residents of Goring Heath and surrounding area have already registered as supporters through our website and many have also promised financial support.


Saving the Planet

If you have to travel, why not think about Carbon Offsetting?

While the ideal is to reduce the amount of carbon we produce by reducing the amount we travel, the reality is that most of us have to travel significant distances from time to time.

Climate Stewards - a branch of the charity A Rocha - has developed a tool to help us think through some of the implications of our lifestyles.

Their website has a simple carbon calculator (www.climatestewards.org/carbon-calculators/). You can enter the details of your planned trip and compare the impact of the different forms of transport. It also enables you to calculate the amount of carbon you are generating - on a specific trip or during more everyday aspects of living.



You are able to donate to projects that offset your carbon usage against projects that reduce the global use of carbon. A number of companies offer carbon-reducing options, from planting and "farming" sustainable forestry to projects, often in the global south, which both mitigate carbon production and bring tangible developments to the communities and local environment in which they are based. Examples include plastic recycling, tree growing, and the provision of fireless stoves. The cost of offsetting a cubic ton of carbon varies between companies, depending on the way the offsetting is achieved.

"Being Carbon Neutral means engaging in the process of reducing emissions as part of a target-driven carbon management plan, whilst compensating for what has not yet been reduced by carbon offsetting, Being Carbon Neutral doesn't indicate a lack of ambition but recognises that the journey towards Net Zero will take time"

Asian Hornet Danger

Goring Heath Parish Council have agreed to join a national monitoring programme of the Asian Hornet managed through a beekeeper from Reading Beekeeping Association.

We have ordered some Asian Hornet traps and some bait. We plan to start monitoring as soon as we can, but it's unlikely we'll see any this Spring. We wanted to get ready and be prepared for when they will arrive.

With the help of Sue, one of our local residents, we can then monitor the traps until the end of April and repeat the process for a 6-8 week period in the Autumn.



Each monitoring trap will need to be placed at head height (for ease of inspection) and positioned where they can be seen regularly during the day – peoples' gardens or place of work would be best. Once the Asian hornets arrive (?Autumn 24 or Spring 25), GHPC will then purchase more traps and we'll do more intense monitoring and trapping of AH queens to stop nests being established. This is a huge threat to our native bee population. The traps allow other insects in, but they can escape - only the hornet will remain in the trap for collection.

Sue has agreed to help us look at the map area and suggest a few places to locate the traps. Ideally, they should be spread throughout the parish at 1km² locations. If you would like to help us in this task and would like to help monitor a trap for us, please get in touch.


